
Methodological Details



Sample size:	 1respondents representing the voting-age population in Ukraine (18 years+). 		
Margin of error:	• ±2.2% within a 95% confidence interval.		
Sample area coverage:	 All the administrative divisions of Ukraine; observations were allocated proportionately at the national level with an over-sample of observations in Kyiv. 		
Fieldwork dates:	• April 8-15, 2014		
Survey firm:	 IFES contracted with the Kiev International Institute of Sociology (KIIS) to conduct fieldwork and data processing for the survey. 		
Funding:	 The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) provided funding for this survey. 		
Weights:	 Data was weighted by age, region and gender to bring the realized sample in line with target population parameters in order to be nationally representative of the adult (18+) population of Ukraine. 		



Stability of Current Situation in Ukraine






"And how would you characterize the current situation in Ukraine in terms of stability? Do you think the current situation in Ukraine is..." (n=2,039)


Level of Control Exercised by Ukrainian Government






Government of Prime Minister Yatseniuk






Legitimacy of Yatseniuk Government (in the East)






Does Government Represent All Ukraine? (in the East)






Likelihood of Voting in Presidential Election






Presidential Election Preference among Likely Voters






Perceived Integrity of Presidential Election







Corruption in Ukraine


- Strict punishment for corruption (29%)
- More transparency (26%)
- Change those in power to those who will fight corruption (10%)
- Changes in legislation (10%)
- Change people's attitudes toward corruption (9%)
- Ban corruption officials from public office (7%)
- Better salaries for public officials (5%)
- Other (9%)

Focus Groups:

- Better salaries
- Sufficient legislation
- Independent authority to pursue corruption
- Public information/socialization
- Punishment for public officials, especially higher levels
- Several mentions of examples set by Georgia (electronic records) and Belarus (strict punishments)
- People will not stop paying bribes because it is necessary, and they need to see some action by the government to show that it is serious

Values Most Closely Associated with Ukrainian Way of Life






Values Ukraine Shares with Russia/West



"What values does Ukraine share with the West?" (n=499)




"What values does Ukraine share with Russia?" (n=675)






Opinions on Russia

Center - Eur. (59%), Rus. (4%), Both (17%)


North - Eur. (50%), Rus. (8%), Both (22%)

Opinions on Discrimination against Russian Language in Ukraine






The Russian language is discriminated against in Ukraine

Status of Russian Language in Ukraine






- DK/NR

Ukrainian Nationalism






Ukrainian nationalism represented by figures like Bandera is a dangerous historical phenomena presenting a threat to non-ethnic Ukrainians.

Opinion on Whether Current Divisions in Ukraine will be Overcome



Best Type of Governance for Ukraine







Opinions on More Powers for Oblast and Resolution of Differences


"Do you think this system of government can help to resolve differences between different regions of Ukraine?" (n=2,039)
