# **INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS**

## PUNCH OUT OFFICIAL BALLOT ONLY WITH VOTING INSTRUMENT ATTACHED TO VOTING DEVICE, NEVER WITH PEN OR PENCIL.

To vote for a candidate whose name appears in the Sample Official Ballot, punch the official ballot at the point of the arrow opposite the number which corresponds to that candidate. Where two or more candidates for the same office are to be elected, punch the official ballot at the point of the arrow opposite the number which corresponds to those candidates. The number of punches made must not exceed the number of candidates to be elected.


To vote for a candidate for Chief Justice of California: Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; Presiding Justice, Court of Appeal; or Associate Justice, Court of Appeal, punch the ballot card in the hole at the point of the arrow to the right of the number which corresponds with "YES." To vote against the candidate, punch the ballot card in the hole at the point of the arrow to the right of the number which corresponds with "NO."

To vote for a qualified write-in candidate, write the name of the office and the person's name on the lines provided for that purpose on the "Write-in" portion of the official ballot.

To vote on a measure which appears in the Sample Official Ballot, punch the official ballot at the point of the arrow opposite the number which corresponds to the word "YES" or the word "NO."

All distinguishing marks or erasures are forbidden and make the official ballot void.

If you punch the wrong number, tear, or deface the official ballot, return the official ballot to the Precinct Official and obtain another.


