## Make your vote count



Share this leaflet with everyone - especially people who cannot read themselves, so that on Election Day, everyone can cast their vote.

### When must you vote?

The General Election takes place on 2 June 1999, 7:00-21:00.

### Where must you vote?

You should cast your vote at the voting station where you registered. Call 0800 11 8000 tollfree or 083 122 (cellular rates apply) to confirm the exact location of your polling station.

### What do you need to vote?

When you go to the voting station where you registered to vote, remember to take your bar-coded ID or temporary identity certificate with you. The election officials will need to see it before you can vote.

### Will there be two ballots and why?

Yes. You have a vote for both the National Assembly and the Provincial Legislature for the province in which you are registered as a voter.

If you have any questions about what to do while at the voting station, ask a voting official - they are there to help you. The voting procedure booklet will explain what you should do at the voting station.

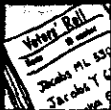


# ELECTION '99



## 1. Show your ID

Show your bar-coded ID or your temporary Identity Certificate to the election officials.



## 2. Voters' Roll

Your name will be checked against the voters' roll.



## 3. Two ballot papers

You will be given two ballot papers stamped with the official stamp. One will be for the National Assembly and the other for the Provincial Legislature.



## 4. Visible indelible Ink

Your left thumb and nail will be marked with visible indelible ink.



## 5. Vote

Vote for the National Assembly. Make your mark on the ballot paper next to the party of your choice for the national assembly.

Vote for the Provincial Legislature. Make your mark on the ballot paper next to the party of your choice for the Provincial Legislature.



## 6. Ballot Box

Place both ballot papers in the ballot box after you have folded the ballot paper to conceal your vote and have shown the folded paper to the presiding officer to enable him or her to see the official stamp thereon.
