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
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




For the first time in South Africa's history ALL of our citizens can vote for a new government on April 27 and 28.



WE SHOULD:

- make sure voters know how to vote, and know their rights
- condemn violence and intimidation
- allow people to express different political opinions
- allow all parties to campaign for support in the elections
- allow all parties and people to hold public meetings and attend meetings
 - allow all parties to publish and distribute election material, and to put up posters and banners.

WE SHOULD NOT:

- use violence or intimidation
- incite anyone else to violence or intimidation
- carry weapons to political meetings or events
- publish lies and false stories about others
- call meetings for the same time and place as other parties
- stop any party or candidate from reaching voters to campaign
- use the symbols, name or colours of another party
- bribe people from other parties
- use positions of power to tell people how to vote.

WOMEN should participate freely in voter education and in all political activity. Women must also have FREE CHOICE who they will vote for ...

All parties in the election PROMISE to follow the Code of Conduct, and make sure their supporters follow it.

All parties will ACCEPT THE OUTCOME of the election.

When you vote, you must show voting officials ONE of these documents

(these are called "Voter Eligibility Documents"):

- An identity document (the old dark blue one or the new green one); OR
- A reference book (all three versions), OR
- An ID issued by Transkei, Venda, Bophutatswana, or Ciskei, OR
- An old green identity card (issued before 1972), OR
- A temporary identity certificate (issued when your ID was lost)

At foreign stations ONLY you car 'so vote with a valid South African Passport.

OR you can get a Temporary Voter's Card.

Temporary Voter Cards are issued ONLY to a person who does not have another voter's eligibility document.



Arrangements have already been made for voters' cards to be issued at permanent offices and through mobile units of the Department of Home Affairs.

To get an ID or Temporary Voter's Card, you will need to submit your birth certificate

or any one of the following documents:

- a baptismal certificate
- clinic or hospital cards from your childhood
- primary school records from your childhood
- a house permit that shows your name
- a letter from local ortraditional authority


OR you can bring a person who has an ID who knows you

Don't forget:

you should make only ONE mark next to the party YOU want to vote for!

This is what happens when you vote on April 27 or 28:

- Before you enter the polling station, an election official will see that you have the right documents (an ID, reference book, or temporary voters card).
- Inside the poiling station, you will put your hand under an ultra-violet light, to show that you have not voted before in this election
- 3 After this, you put your hand on a sponge with an invisible ink. This ink will only show under the ultra-violet light, so that you cannot come again to vote.
- After this, an official will check your papers to make sure you have the right to vote
- The officials will give you the NATIONAL BALLOT PAPER. This will list all the parties that you can vote for to become the NATIONAL GOVERNMENT.

 SET IN ASSEMBLY
- You then take your NATIONAL BALLOT PAPER to a polling booth. You should make an x or a. ONLY in the blank space next to the party YOU want to vote for.
- You put the ballot paper into the BALLOT BOX for the national government.
 PROUNCIAL
- THEN you are given a REGIONAL BALLOT PAPER, with the list of parties that you can vote for to become the REGIONAL GOVERNMENT.
- You take this to another polling booth, and put an x or a √in the blank space next to the party you want to vote for in the BEGIONAL GOVERNMENT.

 You put this regional ballot paper in the BALLOT BOX for regional Provincial

 - You have now voted, and you can leave the polling station.

REMEMBER: There will be lots of people at the polling station. There will be voting officials to help you vote, international monitors and monitors from the different parties to see that the voting is fair, and of course many people voting.

SPECIAL VOTERS: Special arrangements will be made for voters who are ill or infirm or physically disabled or pregnant, and therefore cannot get to a polling booth to vote on the 27th and 28th. These people will be able to vote on April 26th. Places for special voters to vote will include: Registered Hospitals, Old Age Homes, Prisons, and Police Stations.

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
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



WHAT ARE WE VOTING FOR?

When you vote on April 27 and 28, you will help CHOOSE A NEW GOVERNMENT FOR SOUTH AFRICA. You will choose who will represent you in the new Parliament. You will choose the people who will write a new constitution.

The new government will put in place laws, taxes, and programmes that will affect all of our lives. It will decide upon the educational system, health and welfare programmes, water and sanitation, and how towns and communities develop. It will affect all of us.

Now ALL the people of South Africa have a chance to decide upon who is in our government.

The majority of people in this country have never had a chance to vote for the government. This is our chance. We can choose a government that is OF the people, FOR the people, and BY the people.

So VOTE.

Why will we have a double ballot?

Under the present interim Constitution there will be two levels of government.

The National Assembly will have the power to make certain decisions for the whole country.

The Provincial Legislature

will have the power to make certain kinds of decisions in each region or province. There will be nine Provincial legislatures — one for each region of South Africa.

in the election you will be choosing the party you think is best at national level, AND the party you think is best at provincial level. You will have one ballot for each.

Some political parties will be standing for election in the National

Assembly and in all nine Provincial Legislatures. But other parties may only stand for the National Assembly, or for one, or a few of the Provincial Legislatures.

If you think one party is best for both national and regional government you can vote for the same party both times. Remember that you still have to mark an x or a \(\sqrt{} \) for that party on both ballot papers.

But you do not have to vote for the same party both times.

You may think that the ideas and plans of one party are best for the National Assembly. But you may also decide that the ideas and plans of another party are better to govern your own province.

The double ballot lets you express these different choices.

What will the ballot papers be like?

- National Assembly
 will be the same for the whole country. It will list all the parties which want to take part in the National Assembly.
- Provincial Legislature
 will be different in each of the nine provinces. It will list only the parties which want to take part in that Provincial Legislature.

Because the provincial ballot paper will be different in each region, it will not be available outside that region. So people who are casting their vote outside their own province will not be able to vote for members of their Provincial Legislature.

But wherever you are voting, you will be able vote for the National Assembly.
