WHAT IS THE INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL COMMISSION?

The INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL COMMISSION is responsible for holding the election, running the voting stations, and making sure that the elections are free and fair.

All the parties in the negotiations agreed upon the people who make up the INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL COMMISSION.

This is what happens when you vote on April 27 or 28:

1. Go to the voting station.

2. Show your papers

3. Put your hand in the box with the special light.

4. Then dip your hand in the invisible ink

5. An official will check your papers

6. Take the FIRST ballot paper, to vote for NATIONAL government..

7. Go to the first polling booth and make your mark.

8. Put the ballot paper in the FIRST ballot box.

9. Take the SECOND ballot paper, to vote for the REGIONAL legislature..

10. Go to the second polling booth and make your mark.

11. Put this ballot paper in the second ballot box.
