PART I

VOTER ASSISTANCE

ELECTRONIC TRANSMISSION OF ELECTION MATERIALS

Often, transmitting voting materials by mail prevents timely receipt and return of materials. When such conditions exist, possibly preventing an individual from voting, electronic transmission may be possible. This type of usage in the absentee voting process is not universally accepted in all states. Generally, there are three possibilities or combinations allowed by states:

- 1.) Send the FPCA or registration and ballot request by fax.
- 2.) Receive the ballot by fax.
- 3.) Return the voted ballot by fax.

Consult your unit or Embassy/Consular voting assistance officer for the procedures for the electronic transmission process. The *Voting Assistance Guide* explains the electronic transmission process and each state's procedures.

VOTING INFORMATION CENTER (VIC)

The Voting Information Center (VIC) provides information on elections, and recorded messages from Governors, U.S. Senators and Representatives. Sixty days prior to an election, messages from candidates for these offices are also available.

Callers may leave a voice message for their Governor, U.S. Senators and U.S. Representative, or their chief state election official. Messages from callers will be forwarded to the appropriate official for direct response.

Any questions concerning voting, elections, candidates or issues which cannot be answered locally may be referred to the VIC. The VIC provides direct access to Service and State Department Voting Action Officers.

OMBUDSMAN SERVICE

The difficulty of communicating information between election officials and the voters is magnified when citizens are overseas. Voters may be disenfranchised as a result of this communication problem. The Federal Voting Assistance Program provides an Ombudsman service for both the voter and local election officials to resolve problems which cannot be solved locally or answer questions concerning procedures for registration and ballot requests, including timely receipt of ballots. With the international toll-free lines contained in this brochure on page 4, citizens and local election officials may receive assistance. The number for citizens in the United States is 1 (800) 438-VOTE. Assistance is available during normal business hours, Eastern Time, or you may leave a recorded message at other times.

PART IV

HOW TO COMMUNICATE WITH YOUR MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

Facts on Congressional Representation

- ☆ There are 100 Senators in the U.S. Senate, two per state. Each of the two U.S. Senators from your state represents you in the U.S. Senate.
- ☆ There are 435 Representatives in the U.S. House of Representatives. Only one Representative, the Congressman or Congresswoman from your state congressional district, represents you in the House of Representatives.

To find out who your U.S. Representative is, call the U.S. Capitol Switchboard at (202)224-3121. Tell the Operator your ZIP Code to learn who represents you in Congress.

Congressional Office

Each Member of Congress has two types of offices:

- ☆ The Washington, DC office should be contacted regarding legislative matters or concerns, as well as for the constituent services listed on page 21 in this pamphlet.
- ☆ The Congressman's district office or Senator's state offices take care of personal matters (i.e., late or incorrect Social Security payments, problems with the IRS, obtaining small business loans, disaster relief, etc.).

Congressional Staff

Administrative Assistant (A.A.)—supervises daily office activities, monitors state/district "temperature" on various issues, maintains liaison with the state/district political machinery, and often manages the re-election campaign.

Legislative Assistant (L.A.)—one or more per office, performs background research, monitors legislative proposals, makes recommendation to Member of Congress¹ regarding the merit of any particular bill (pros and cons).

Press Secretary—maintains and cultivates public image for the Member of Congress through the media.

Appointments Secretary—schedules the Member's time and meetings, speeches, etc., to ensure the most effective use of time.

Caseworker—resolves individual constituents' problems with the federal government.

Receptionist—greet visitors, answers the phone, controls traffic flow in the office.

¹ In this text, "Member of Congress" is used to designate both Representatives and Senators. Normally, "Member of Congress" generally refers to Representatives and "Senator" refers to Senator.

CONTACTING YOUR MEMBERS OF CONGRESS BY TELEPHONE

The Congressional Switchboard in Washington, DC

The U.S. Capitol switchboard operator at (202)224-3121 will connect you to the office of any Senator or Congressman, to the Senate or House Committees, or to the Senate or House Document Rooms.

Regarding Legislative Matters

1. Call the Washington, DC office of your Senator or Congressman or his/her local state/district office.
2. State your name and the city or town you are from.
3. Determine your objective in advance. Do you intend to merely give your opinion, or do you wish to actually discuss a matter with someone, offering suggestions, etc? Most offices keep tally sheets on "hot" legislative issues, so if you wish to call and simply register your opinion on a given matter, they will be glad to register your "vote." If you want to take it further, ask for the legislative assistant who handles your subject (taxes, for instance) and identify the legislative issue, bill, or committee report that is of concern to you. Tell him how the issue will affect you. Ask what the Member intends to do about it, or how he/she is planning to vote.
4. If you have requested a document, etc., some Congressional offices will ask that you send a letter stating your request in writing. Congressional offices often take 2-4 weeks to reply.

Regarding Personal Matters

1. Call the Washington, DC office of your Senator or Congressman or his/her local state/district office.
2. State your name and the city or town where you are from.
3. Ask for the caseworker and identify your problem or need, (i.e., information on late or incorrect social security payments, or any other problem dealing with federal departments or agencies).
4. Some Congressional offices will then request that you send a letter to the Senator or Congressman, explaining your problem in writing.

Guidelines on Composing Your Letter

1. Address the letter to *your* Representative or Senator(s) who represents you in Congress. You are his/her *constituent* and he/she is interested in your opinions!
2. Immediately identify the subject you are writing about. If it concerns a specific bill, identify it by name and number (S.-"Senate bill"/H.R.-"House bill"). Limit your letter to one topic.
3. Tell the Senator or Representative why you are advocating this position. State facts; give examples. Tell how the legislation will affect you and your company, group, etc. Do not generalize. Be specific.
4. Keep the letter polite. It should be positive and constructive. Never threaten.
5. Repeat your reason for writing. Thank the Senator or Representative for his/her cooperation.

Faxing Your Letter

Nearly all Congressional Offices have a fax machine. Please telephone the Member's office first to find out the fax number and the best time to send your fax.

Checklist

- Include your local address on the letter.
- Keep the letter to one page, at most two.
- Type the letter or write neatly.
- Do not send a photocopy.
- Type/print your name underneath your signature.

Special Constituent Services Available Through Your Congressional Office

- ★ House or Senate Gallery passes to observe Congress in session. Tickets are to be picked up at your Senator's or Representative's office.
- ★ Tickets for Congressional White House tours. Write to your Senator or Representative requesting these tickets six to eight weeks in advance of your trip to Washington.
- ★ Tickets for Congressional FBI, State Department, Supreme Court, Voice of America, Treasury Department, and Kennedy Center tours. Follow the same procedure as for obtaining Congressional White House tickets.
- ★ Flags flown over the U.S. Capitol. Check with your Member of Congress' office for cost and size availability. Check or money order prepayment is necessary.
- ★ Congressional Newsletter. Most Members of Congress send out monthly newsletters to keep in touch with their constituents. Ask to be placed on their mailing lists.

PART V

THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS

1. A bill is written. A Senator or Representative may develop original legislation, or a trade association or private citizens may request that a bill be prepared, and may assist in its writing.
2. A bill is introduced in the Senate and/or House. It is assigned a number (S.— in the Senate and H.R.— in the House). Its title and sponsors are published in the Congressional Record.
3. The Parliamentarians of the House and Senate assign bills to committees with the appropriate jurisdiction. Both House and Senate committees have a number of subcommittees. The chairman of the committee usually then assigns the bill to the subcommittee with the most appropriate jurisdiction.
4. The subcommittee may hold hearings on the bill and invite testimony from public and private witnesses. Individuals may make their views known by testifying, by providing a written statement, or by allowing interest groups to represent their views.
5. Once the hearings are completed, the subcommittee may meet to “mark-up” the bill—to consider amendments. It then votes on whether to report the bill favorably to the full committee. If not favorably reported, the bill dies.
6. The full committee may repeat any or all of the subcommittee’s actions: hearings, mark-up, and vote. If the committee votes favorably on the bill, it is ordered reported to either the House of Representatives (if the bill was being considered on the House side) or to the Senate (if the bill was being considered on the Senate side).
7. When the bill reaches the floor of the House or Senate, the membership of the entire body can debate it. At this stage, the bill may be further amended, referred back to committee, or voted up or down.
8. If the Bill is passed by the House or Senate, it is referred to the other body. A House-passed bill may be placed directly on the Senate Calendar, bypassing the subcommittees and committee reviews. Usually, however, the subcommittees and committees in both bodies have an opportunity to hold hearings, debate, and amend legislative proposals. Related or identical legislation often proceeds through the House and Senate simultaneously.
9. If a bill is passed in identical form by the House and Senate, it can be immediately delivered to the President.

10. If there are significant differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill, an ad hoc conference committee is appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to resolve the differences. Conference committees are composed of Senators and Representatives on the committees which originally considered the legislation.
11. If the conferees are unable to reach agreement, the legislation dies. If they do reach agreement, the bill is sent back to both the House and Senate. Both must approve the conference committee bill.
12. The bill then goes to the President for his signature. He has four options: (1) if he signs the bill, it becomes law; (2) if he takes no action within ten days while Congress is in session, the bill becomes law; (3) if he takes no action while Congress is adjourned at the end of the second session, the bill is "pocket vetoed" and dies; or, (4) the President may veto the bill.
13. If the President vetoes a bill, Congress may attempt to "override the veto." This requires a two-thirds vote by both the House and Senate. If either fails to get a two-thirds vote, the bill is dead. If both succeed, the bill becomes law.

PART VI

ELECTIONS AND ELECTED OFFICIALS

Federal Elections and Officials

Of nearly 500,000 elected officials in the U.S., only 542 are federal officials—1 President, 1 Vice President, 100 U.S. Senators (two from each state), 435 U.S. Representatives, and 5 Delegates to the House of Representatives from U.S. territories and the District of Columbia.

Elections for federal offices are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of election years. The president and vice president stand for election every four years. All registered voters are eligible to vote for President and Vice President.

Senators serve six-year terms, with one-third of them up for election every even year. (See page 17 for Senate classes.) Senators are chosen in statewide elections and represent all citizens of their state.

All 440 Representatives and Delegates must stand for re-election every even year. U.S. Representatives are elected by the voters of the district they represent. Most congressional districts have about 550,000 residents, but some states with small populations, such as Montana, Delaware, Vermont, and Alaska, have a single Representative (at-large) who represents the entire state.

The powers and responsibilities of federal officials are defined in the Constitution. In general, federal officials deal with matters and enact policies that effect the whole nation. For example, federal officials formulate national security policy and regulate international trade. They also deal with certain local or personal issues where the federal government is involved, such as making sure veterans receive the benefits to which they are entitled.

State Elections and Officials

All states hold statewide elections for key state officials. These include, for most states, the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, and Secretary of State. In many states, there are other officials who are elected in statewide elections, such as State Supreme Court Justices, Comptroller, and Treasurer. All citizens of a state who are registered to vote in that state are eligible to vote for these statewide officials.

Among other state elected officials are State Senators and State Legislators. These officials are elected by the voters of the districts they serve. The terms of state officials vary by state, but the typical term of a governor is two or four years. State legislators typically serve two-year terms.

State officials deal largely with statewide issues such as the level of state taxation, educational requirements, transportation, and social services.

A referendum may also appear on a statewide ballot in many states. A referendum is a method of submitting a legislative matter to the voters for approval or rejection. Other matters which may appear on the state ballot in some states are bond initiatives, amendments to the state constitution, and recalls of state elected officials.

Local Elections and Officials

Local officials include mayor, town or city council members, county commissioner, county sheriff, township supervisor, school board member and many others, from city dogcatcher to county coroner. The number and titles of elected local officials vary from locality to locality and from state to state.

Local officials make up the vast majority of elected officials in the U.S. Among their major areas of responsibility are public education, maintenance of city streets and county roads, local sanitation facilities, police and public safety, zoning, and local parks and recreation.

KEY ELECTION TERMS

Affidavit—sworn statement in writing, usually made under oath or affirmation, before an authorized officer, notary, or court official.

Attest—to witness the signing of a document.

Ballot—sheet of paper or the like on which a voter marks his choice.

Congressional District—division of a state, based on population, electing one member to the U.S. House of Representatives.

Constituent—citizens represented by the official they elect.

Domicile (Voting Residence)—place where a person has a true, fixed, and permanent home or ties, and to which, whenever absent, has the intention of returning. It is the address that generally ties the voter to the precinct in which the voter intends to vote.

Electoral Vote—votes casts for president and vice president by presidential electors. When a citizen votes for a presidential candidate, the ballot is actually cast for the group of presidential electors associated with that candidate in that state.

Elector—a qualified voter. Also used for the 538 members of the Electoral College.

Federal Ballot—ballot listing only candidates for federal offices—President, Vice President, Senate, and House of Representatives.

Federal Write-in Absentee Ballot—special ballot available from Voting Assistance Officers, which enables voters to write in their choices for candidates for federal offices.

General Election—election held to choose among previously nominated candidates for federal, state, and local offices.

Majority—a number greater than half of the total votes cast.

Municipal Election—election held in a city or town to vote for local officials or on questions of local interest.

Plurality—the number of votes cast for the candidate receiving the most votes, though not a majority, in a contest of more than two candidates.

Popular Vote—number of votes cast by the people, as distinguished from the electoral vote.

Primary Election—election held to nominate a political party's candidates for office. Those candidates winning their respective party's nomination in the primary election face off in the general election.

Closed Primary—primary in which voters must declare their political party affiliation and choose a candidate from that party's ballot.

Open Primary—primary in which voters may vote for the candidates of any party listed on the ballot.

Runoff—election held in some states if no candidate receives a specified percentage of the vote in the general election.

Voting Residence—voter's domicile, generally. However, the voting residence of an American voting pursuant to the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act and no longer domiciled in the United States will be the place in which he was last domiciled immediately prior to his departure from the United States.

Write-in—method of voting for a person whose name is not on the ballot. Federal and state write-in absentee ballots are available. See your Voting Officer for details.

VOTER CHECK-OFF LIST

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces, the Merchant Marine, and civilians overseas often must rely on absentee balloting in order to vote. The absentee balloting process is easy if you plan ahead and get the information you need. Voting Officers are available in every unit to assist members of the U.S. Armed Forces. Help is available to other U.S. citizens at all U.S. embassies and consulates overseas. This check-off list highlights some of the major steps in the voting process:

- Eligibility**
Are you eligible to vote? In most states, you must be a U.S. citizen 18 years or older on the date of the election.
- Voting Residence**
Determine your voting residence. If you are uncertain, contact your voting officer (for military personnel) or the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate for assistance.
- Registration**
If your state requires registration, make sure you are registered to vote at your voting residence. If not, you can register by mail.
- Absentee Ballot Request**
Request your absentee ballot at least 60 days before the election.
- Be a Responsible Voter**
Stay informed on upcoming elections, including dates, candidates and issues. (For more information, see page 3 of this booklet.)
- VOTE!**
Promptly complete and mail your absentee ballot regardless of when you receive it.
