VOTING INFORMATION

Who is eligible to register to vote?

Anyone who is:

- A U.S. Citizen
- In possession of civil rights
- 18 years of age by election day
(Pre-registration information available upon request)
- A permanent resident of Orange County, Florida

Where do I go to register?

Apply in person at:

- Supervisor of Elections Office, 119 W Kaley Street, Orlando
- An outreach site (call 836-2070 for locations)

What identification is needed when I register to vote?

- Any identification showing your name, and current Orange County residence address

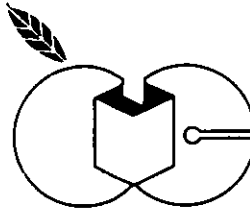
What if I reside within a city?

- Once registered by the county you are automatically registered for city, county, state and federal elections

Will I ever need to re-register?

- Only if you fail to vote or let us hear from you over a five-year period.

Your new voter I.D. card, when signed on the front, right side may be used as identification at the polls on election day. However, this card is not required to vote nor is it an authorization to vote.

The left front section of the card lists the district and polling place assignment for your residence street address. You must be registered and vote in the precinct where you are residing on election day.

The front of your card also designates the district number for your member of Congress in Washington, your State Senator, and your Florida Representative. Also shown are the numbers for your county commission district and your school board district. If you live in a municipality, your city commissioner's district will also be shown by number.

On the back of your voter card, there is a form which you should use in the event your residence address changes, if your name has changed, or if you wish to change party affiliation. To make such a change, complete the appropriate portion(s) of the form, sign your name in the pink box and mail it to the Supervisor of Elections Office. Your registration record will be updated and you will be sent a new card.

When are elections held?

- City charters dictate election dates within municipalities--some are each year.
- Regularly scheduled county, state and federal elections are held in even-numbered years.
- Presidential preference primary elections are held every four years--the next one being in 1992.

Do I have to register in a political party?

- Florida is a closed primary state. In order to vote in a party primary election you must be a registered voter in either the Democratic or Republican party. You may register in one of those parties or in any other party or in no party. No matter how you are registered, you may vote for any candidate from any party in the November general election. You may change your party affiliation anytime the books are open.

What are Non-partisan elections?

- Judges and elected city officials are decided in Non-partisan elections, as are all ballot issues (referendums, amendments, and bond issues).

When are the polls open on election day?

- The polls open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. on election day.

Where do I go to vote?

- To the polling place for the precinct where you reside on election day.

What if I am unable to vote in person on election day?

- You will be permitted to vote by absentee ballot

Where can I apply for an absentee ballot?

- Contact the Supervisor of Elections Office, 119 W. Kaley Street, Orlando, FL 32806.
- **IMPORTANT:** The voted absentee ballot must be returned to the office of the Supervisor of Elections by 7 P.M. on election day.

It is your legal obligation to contact the Supervisor of Elections Office in person or By Mail, if:

- You move within the county (If you move out of Orange County, re-register with your new county elections office.)
- You wish to change political parties
- Your name changes
- You have a separate mailing address
- You need an absentee ballot
- You lose your registration card

Does my vote really count?

- Every vote counts!
- By a margin of just one vote, Texas, California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho became states.
- The impeachment of President Andrew Johnson failed by just one vote.

- On November 8, 1923, Adolf Hitler was elected leader of his political party by just one vote.
- England's King Charles I literally lost his head when the vote to behead him was 67 against 68 for.
- The Alaska Purchase of 1867 was ratified by just one vote.
- Your vote is your voice in the elections.

When are voter registration drives conducted?

- Throughout the year on publicly announced dates and at specific outreach sites
- Each spring in local high schools for students at least 17 years of age
- On the 4th of July at special outreach sites and at the elections office
- Note: Special voter registration drives can be arranged for clubs and organizations and special areas through your Supervisor of Elections. Call 836-2070 for details.

Who can register citizens to vote?

- Employees of the Supervisor of Elections Office and deputized volunteers

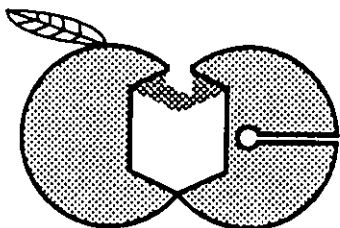
The Supervisor of Elections Office is proud of its Volunteer Deputy Registrar Program.
