Voter Registration

You can register to vote if:

- you are a citizen of the United States.
 - you will be 18 years old on the day of the next election.
 - you are a legal resident of the City and County of Honolulu.
-

Military and dependents can register too

Members of our Armed Services and their dependents, who live on a military base in the City and County of Honolulu and who intend to establish legal residency here, are subject only to the same voting qualifications that apply to a non-military resident.

Re-Register

Sometimes you have to register again, even though you have done so before. Re-registration is required if:

- you did not vote at all in the last regular primary and general election, or
 - you have changed your name or address since the last election.

It's easy to register

Just appear in person at the Clerk's Office or at any satellite city hall offices on Oahu, Monday thru Friday between 7:45 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. On election years, you may also register with:

- the Lt. Governor's Office.
 - registrars located throughout the City and County of Honolulu
 - special door-to-door registrars

Absentee Registration

If you're a qualified voter, and can't register in person, request a registration application from the City Clerk. It must be filled out and sworn to before a notary public or commissioned officer authorized to administer oaths, and returned to the Clerk's Office before the registration deadline.

Registration Deadline

Registrations for 1976 are closed at 4:30 p.m. on the following dates:

- Party Ballot Changes for the Primary – July 2
- Registration for the Primary – September 2
- Registration for the General – October 1

Absentee Voting

You may request an absentee ballot from the Clerk's Office if:

- you are qualified to vote in the 1976 elections.
 - you will be out of the state, county or district on Election Day.
 - you are confined at a hospital or institution.
 - you are ill or disabled at home.
 - you are prevented from attending the polls by religious beliefs.

Voting By Mail

Voters who will be absent from the City and County of Honolulu should make a ballot request in writing no sooner than 60 days and no later than 7 days before an election.

Voters who are confined at home, at a hospital or an institution may request a ballot to be forwarded to them or picked up by an authorized representative up to Election Day. The ballot, however, must be returned to the Clerk's Office by the closing of the polls at 6 p.m.

Voting In Person

Voters who will be away from their representative district on Election Day may vote in person at the Clerk's Office within the 10-day period prior to Election Day.

Primary Absentee

Absentee requests for the Primary are accepted on the following dates. However, you may also request a ballot for both the Primary and General at the same time.

- Out of State – August 3 to September 25
- Confinees – up to 6:00 p.m. on October 2
- Voting in Office – September 22 to October 1
7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday
8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon Saturday

Remember, voters without any party designation must declare their party ballot preference in order to receive a primary party ballot.

General Absentee

Absentee requests for only the General are accepted on the following dates:

- Out of State – September 3 to October 26
- Confinees – up to 6:00 p.m. on November 2
- Voting in Office – October 23 to November 1
7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday
8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon Saturday

18 yrs. of age
 - House of Representatives 3 yrs. Hawaii Resident

 - Mayor 30 yrs. of age

Nomination Papers

Nomination papers for a candidate for office may be picked up and filed at the Lt. Governor's Office for state and congressional offices and at the City Clerk's Office for city and county offices.

Congressional Offices

- should contain signatures of 25 qualified electors of the same party, or with no party designation on record

State Senate, House of Representative, Mayor

- should contain signatures of 15 qualified electors from the respective districts either of the same party or with no party designation on record
