

# RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD OF ELECTION COMMISSIONERS

Among the several responsibilities of the Board of Election Commissioners are:

- 1. To conduct all primary, general and special elections held on a county-wide basis.
- 2. To provide for the registration of qualified voters within the County.
- 3. To establish voting precincts and polling places, therein.
- 4. To select, train and commission judges of election as submitted by the Chairman of each of the major political parties.
- 5. Generally, to administer the election laws of the State of Illinois, as they apply to DuPage County, and from time to time pass such rules and regulations as are deemed necessary to implement said laws.

The Board is bipartisan in structure with one of its members of each major political party, and all three members are appointed by the circuit court. The Chief Clerk is appointed by the Board, as is its legal counsel.

The three member board is appointed by the circuit court and is bipartisan in structure with two of its members representing each of the two major political parties. The Chief Clerk is appointed by the Board, as is the legal counsel.

# FACTS FOR VOTERS ON REGISTRATION and VOTING

#### WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER?

To be eligible to register to vote a person must:

Be a citizen of the United States

Be 18 years of age or over

Reside at his or her present address 30 days

As of the date of the next election

Residence Defined - A residence is a permanent abode, a place where a person actually lives within the precinct. No one may register from a place of business or office unless he actually lives there and has no other dwelling place.

#### WHO MUST REGISTER?

Every qualified person who desires to vote who has:

- 1. Not registered
- 2. Changed name by marriage or otherwise.
- 3. Failed to transfer his registration to his present address, and whose registration was cancelled as a result.
- 4. Failed to reinstate his registration within 30 days of "A Notice of Suspension" and whose registration was cancelled as a result.

In an effort to maintain current registration records, Illinois law requires election authorities to periodically mail notices of suspension to those registered voters who have failed to vote for a period of four or more years. The voter may reinstate his registration by signing the notice and returning it to the office of the Board of Election Commissioners within 30 days.

#### WHERE AND WHEN YOU MAY REGISTER:

1. The office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners, 421 N. County Farm Road, Wheaton, Illinois 60187.

Weekdays 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

Four Saturdays preceding the close of registrations for any county wide Primary or General election 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 Noon.

2. In addition to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners Office, voters may also register in the following City, Village and Township Offices, whose clerks have been duly appointed as a Deputy Registrar.



- 3. Temporary places of registration at various locations in the County. Notice of their time and place are published in advance in a local newspaper.
- 4. Respective Precinct Committeemen who have been duly appointed a Precinct Registrar.

A Voter's Certificate of Registration will be mailed to the applicant within approximately 2-3 weeks.

# CHANGE OF ADDRESS (TRANSFER OF VOTERS REGISTRATION):

Voters who have moved within DuPage County since registering should notify the Board of Election Commissioners by filling out and signing the back of their voter's registration card and mailing it to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.



Notice of change of address may also be given by letter, listing the old and new addresses or by filling out an application for transfer of registration which may be secured in the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners (Fig. 4).

All applications for change of address, either by card or letter, must bear the signature of the voter.

All changes of address must be received in the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners postmarked not later than midnight 28 days prior to any election.

#### PHYSICALLY DISABLED VOTERS:

Citizens who have not registered and cannot leave their homes because of a permanent physical disability will be registered in their homes if they notify the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.

This also applies to permanently disabled persons who cannot leave hospitals, nursing homes or other institutions, to register.

### PERSONS WHO NEED NOT BE REGISTERED TO VOTE:

- 1. Members of the Armed Services in active service and their spouses or dependents.
- 2. Members of the Merchant Marine, and their spouses and dependents.
- Civilian employees of the United States, when outside the territorial limits of the United States, their spouses or dependents.
- 4. Members of religious groups attached to the Armed Services, their spouses or dependents.
- 5. Members of the Armed Services discharged within 60 days prior to said election.

### FOR NEW CITIZENS WHEN REGISTERING TO VOTE:

If you are foreign born, you must give the following information.

Name of court where naturalized - City and State, month, day and year.

All persons born outside of the United States having American born parents must give the name of parents. If you derive citizenship through your parents' naturalization, you must give the following: Name of court where parents were naturalized, City and State, month, day and year.

Name of parent and your age at time of parent's naturalization.

AFTER 1941, both parents must be naturalized before the child is 18, in order for that child to claim citizenship.

AFTER 1952, both parents must be naturalized before the child is 16, in order for that child to claim citizenship.

Exception: When one of the parents is deceased, a child may claim citizenship through one parent.

If you derive citizenship through marriage to an American born citizen, you must give the name of spouse and date of marriage.

PRIOR TO SEPTEMBER 22. 1922, a woman gained citizenship by marriage to a citizen, or lost citizenship by marriage to an alien.

AFTER SEPTEMBER 22, 1922, a woman neither gained nor lost citizenship through marriage.

If you derived citizenship through marriage to a naturalized citizen, you must give the following: the court where husband was naturalized, the City, State, month, day and year of naturalization.

# ALL REGISTRATION MUST BE IN PERSON AT AN OFFICIAL PLACE OF REGISTRATION WITH THE FOLLOWING EXCEPTIONS:

- 1. Persons who are otherwise qualified and who are absent from their places of residence due to business of the United States, or
- 2. Persons who are otherwise qualified and who are unable to appear because of absence from their places of residence and are outside the territorial limits of the United States.

#### PROCEDURE:

Persons who are in the above classifications may apply to the office of the DuPage County Board of Election

Commissioners requesting an "Absentee Registration Form 6-29."

Upon return of the completed application forms, NOT LATER THAN 30 DAYS PRIOR TO AN ELECTION, such persons will become registered voters and eligible to vote in all future elections.

#### **VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT:**

Registered voters - The following voters must be registered in order to vote by absentee ballot.

- 1. Civilians who expect to be temporarily absent from DuPage County on election day and who still maintain a precinct residence under the jurisdiction of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.
- 2. Physically Incapacitated Voters:

There are two categories of physically incapacitated voters.

- a. Voters who are physically incapacitated for a limited time.
- b. Voters who are physically incapacitated permanently. A voter who is physically incapacitated for a limited time must have a medical certificate, which is part of the application, executed by the attending physician or a Christian Science practitioner for each and every election. A voter who has a permanent physical incapacity of such a nature as to make it improbable that he will be able to be present at the polls at any future election may secure a disabled voter's identification card. (Fig. 5)

Upon the receipt of the sworn-to application and the physician's affidavit, the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners shall issue a disabled voter's identification card. A disabled voter's identification card shall be issued for a period of 5 years, upon the expiration of which time the voter may secure a new card by making application in the same manner as is prescribed for the issuance of an original card.



Arrows drawn from the three voter's districts maps to the specimen voter's registration card indicates how the card lists the voter's districts in relation to the maps.

- 3. Voters, who because of their religious beliefs in the observance of a religious holiday, and who, under oath, state that they will not be able to go to the polling place on election day.
- 4. Voters, who because of being appointed judges of election in precincts other than the precincts in which they reside, and who, under oath, state that they will not be able to go to the polling place on election day.
- 5. Voters, who because of election duties in the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners, County Clerk, State's Attorney, or any other election authority, and who state that they will not be able to go to the polling place on election day.
- 6. A voter in the United States Service, who expects in the course of his duties to be absent from the county in which he resides on the day of holding any special, general or primary election, may vote absentee at such election. (Persons in Military or Governmental Service are not required to be registered.)

A mother, father, sister, brother, husband or wife, age 18 or over, of any said elector, may, not more than one hundred or less than five days prior to the date of such election, make an application to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.

Application for such a ballot, when made by the elector, may be made on a Federal Post Card Application (postage free) obtained from his or her post headquarters or on a card furnished by the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.

#### NOTE:

- a. If a person moves from this state to another and establishes a residence there with intent to make the same his permanent home, then he is no longer a resident of Illinois and may not vote in any Illinois election. This is true even though that person has not resided in his new state long enough to be eligible to vote in that state.
- b. Federal or state employees who are absent from their residences because of government or state business have the constitutional right to maintain their previous local residences for voting purposes.

#### PROCEDURE:

A registered voter who meets the said qualifications may request applications for Absentee or Incapacitated Ballots not more than thirty (30) days and not less than five (5) days prior to said Election Day if made by mail, and no less than one (1) day if made in person, in the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners office. If made by mail, each applicant must include his or her name and home address and the address where the application and ballot are to be mailed. If ap-

plications are properly completed, absentee ballots will be mailed to the applicant.

All ballots - voted or not voted, must be returned to the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners sealed in the envelopes provided.

Absentee ballots, in order to be counted, must be returned to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners in sufficient time to enable the ballots to be delivered to their respective polling place before 6:00 P.M. on the day of the election.

#### VOTING IN PERSON (ABSENTEE):

Registered voters who expect to be temporarily out of the County on election day or who qualify for other reasons, may vote in person in the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners as soon as the ballots are available (approximately 30 days before the day of the election).

# PRESIDENTIAL AND VICE-PRESIDENTIAL VOTING:

As a result of recent changes in both federal and state laws, certain persons are now eligible to vote for certain Federal Offices of the United States, whether or not they are regularly registered as voters in the State of Illinois. The new laws permit these persons to both specially register as voters and to vote by absentee process by making application to the proper election official. These persons must be citizens of the United States, 18 years of age or older and they must have resided in the State of Illinois for 30 days as of the date of the Federal Election. The two categories are explained as follows:

### I. NON-RESIDENT CITIZENS NOW RESIDING IN A FOREIGN COUNTRY

A request for application for non-resident registration must be made to the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners not more than 100 days nor less than 30 days prior to the date of such election. The request may be by letter or in person by the applicant or his representative. Upon receipt of the request a *special* registration form will be sent to the voter. Upon return of the completed *special* non-resident registration form the "Federal Offices Only" ballot is mailed to the voter by the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.

# II. ILLINOIS RESIDENTS OR FORMER ILLINOIS RESIDENTS WHO HAVE MOVED OUT OF THEIR PRECINCT WITHIN A 30 DAY PERIOD PRIOR TO THE ELECTION AND WERE REGISTERED AT THE TIME OF THEIR REMOVAL.

A request for application for a "President-Vice-President Only" absentee ballot may be made to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners within the 30 day period, but not later than 5 days prior to the election by mail or 1 day prior to the election in person. These persons must have been registered at their prior residence at the time of their removal. The request may be made by letter or in person, by the applicant or his representative. The "President-Vice-President Only" ballot is then mailed to the voter upon receipt of the completed special application form by the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners or the voter may return, in person, to vote in the boards office.

#### MOTE

Special Registration and/or voting for President-Vice-President does not constitute Permanent Registration under the law. To establish and maintain a permanent voter registration within DuPage County, please refer to those sections of this pamphlet pertaining, thereto.


# VOTING: Mours for Voting on Election Day 6:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

For instructions on the proper use of the vote recorder, there will be recorders on display in the Polling Places and the office of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners. Instructors are available and will be glad to give instructions and answer any questions.


#### **HOW TO VOTE:**

On election day the Judge of Election will give you a ballot card similar to the one shown below. To vote, follow the easy steps outlined here.



1. Using both hands insert your ballot card in the slot at the top center of the vote recorder Be sure card is right-side up.


Slide your ballot card in as far as it will go, positioning the two holes at the top of the card over the two red pins on the vote recorder. Unless the ballot card is so positioned, it is not possible for you to record your vote.



2. Start at front of the ballot page booklet. Using the voting stylus or punch, record your vote by punching the hole next to the candidate or issue of your choice. Hold punch straight up-and-down when voting! Do not vote for more than is allowed in each race or issue.

Continue turning the ballot pages and vote your selection of candidates or issues. Be certain that you vote all ballot pages.

If you make a mistake, remove the card and give it to the Judge of Election for a replacement.



3. When your ballot is completed to your satisfaction, lift your ballot from the red pins and remove it from the vote recorder. Turn ballot pages back for next voter.

For secrecy of your vote, place your ballot card in the special envelope provided.

Should you wish to vote for someone who is not listed in the ballot booklet, you may do so by using the inside flap of the special envelope provided.

Return your ballot card in the envelope to the Judge of Election.

In some elections you may vote upon a paper ballot. In these cases, BE CERTAIN TO PLACE A CROSS [X] IN THE CIRCLE OR BOX to indicate your choice.





Any other type of mark will not be counted by the Judges of Election.

#### ELECTION DATES

#### County

Primary Election - Third Tuesday in March in even numbered years. (tentatively).

General Election - First Tuesday after first Monday in November in even numbered years.

County Elections are held under the jurisdiction of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners who certified the results to the State Board of Elections.

#### Judicial

Judicial Elections are held on the First Tuesday after the First Monday in November in even numbered years. Terms of Supreme Court Justices are ten years; those of Circuit Court Justices are six years.

All Judicial Elections are held under the jurisdiction of the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners who certifies the results to the State Board of Elections. Associate Judges are appointed by the Circuit Judges and serve at their pleasure for a 4 year term.

#### Township

Town elections are held every four years in odd numbered years commencing on the First Tuesday in April, 1977. Town elections are held under the jurisdiction of the Town Clerk who certifies the results to the DuPage County Board of Election Commissioners.

#### City and Village

Elections are held on the Third Tuesday in April, under the jurisdiction of the clerk of the municipality and the results spread upon the records of said municipality.
