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

Pot possession lids discussed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Can a Senate committee unable to agree on how many cigarettes are in an ounce of marijuana decide whether to free the casual smoker from criminal penalties for smoking it?

The problem arose Thursday in Senate Judiciary Committee discussions on whether to remove criminal penalties for possession of small amounts of marijuana.

Three members gave three different opinions on how many joints an ounce of the drug would yield.

The proposed drug law revision is part of a sprawling bill by Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., to revise a host of federal laws ranging from contempt of court orders to lessened penalties for marijuana use.

Kennedy's proposal goes further than previous suggestions for softening penalties. It would legalize possession of up to 10 grams of marijuana, not merely decriminalize it by replacing existing criminal penalties with a

civil fine as President Carter has endorsed.

But Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., thinks 10 grams — about one-third of an ounce — is too small a quantity if the purpose of the change is to recognize that a growing number of Americans of all ages smoke marijuana.

Couching his remarks with terms such as "I'm told" or "I understand," Bayh said his research indicates most persons who smoke marijuana buy it in ounces known as "lids."

Smaller quantities simply aren't sold, Bayh said, and an ounce is "the kind of supply the average user would have."

Decriminalizing or legalizing only up to 10 grams "would still subject the average user to the possibility of a criminal fine," he said.

Bayh said he thought an ounce of marijuana would yield about 30 joints. But Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said a person can get about 70 marijuana cigarettes from an ounce.

And Kennedy said his information was that 10 grams represented about 20 joints — or 60 cigarettes per ounce.

Bayh also objected to legalizing casual possession of marijuana since federal laws are a "symbol" for the states, and Congress should not be "putting the good housekeeping seal of approval on the possession" of any amount of marijuana.

He suggested an amendment to decriminalize, not legalize, possession of up to one ounce, subjecting a person to a \$100 fine but no jail sentence.

Hatch opposed decriminalization but said he would go along with Kennedy's version because of other valuable parts of the bill.

And he told Bayh legalization of 10 grams "is about as good a compromise as anybody is going to get out of this committee."

Other issues in the legislation may be of greater "magnitude," Kennedy said, but the marijuana section is sure to be "one of the toughest political issues in this."

Defunct co-op official is charged

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (UPI) — A Nov. 7 trial date has been set for Russell E. Phillips, alleged mastermind behind the bankrupt Progressive Farmers Association, who was charged Thursday with 21 counts of fraud.

A Greene County grand

jury indicted Phillips in the first criminal action against any former official of the defunct farmers co-op.

Phillips, accompanied by his lawyer Don Cooley, appeared before Circuit Court Judge John Crow to hear the 21-count indictment.

At the request of Greene County Prosecutor Jim Kelly, Crow set Phillips' bond at \$50,000. Cooley called the bond an "excessive" and punitive amount, but Crow maintained his decision.

Before entering the courtroom, Phillips told reporters,

"They think I'm the most important, but really I'm the least important." Phillips apparently was referring to investigative reports that he was the founder and decisionmaker behind PFA which left about 7,000 persons with \$12.7 million in worthless securities.

PFA was forced into bankruptcy May 13 by the Securities and Exchange Commission for alleged securities violations.

Phillips termed the charges "ridiculous" as he left the courtroom after pleading innocent to all counts.

False treatment for gout

DEAR DR. LAMB — Some friends of mine have recommended pantothenic acid for gout and bursitis. What is your opinion on this? I am already taking allopurinol. Should they be mixed?


DEAR READER — To use an old phrase, "with friends like that who needs enemies?" Pantothenic acid has no value at all in treating gout, bursitis or arthritis. There have been a lot of false and exaggerated claims recently in quasi-health publications but none of these are based on legitimate scientific facts.

Pantothenic comes from a Greek word meaning "from everywhere" which aptly describes its general distribution in various foods. You can hardly eat and not get it. It is essential in the coenzymes used in basic cell metabolism but you undoubtedly have enough.

I regard some of the promotion of substances such as pantothenic acid as a cure-all for ailments as akin to selling snake oil at an old fashioned travelling medicine show — one of our earlier forms of quackery.

The real danger in using vitamins in a host of conditions which additional vitamins do not aid is that it prevents the patient from seeking and getting early help for important medical ailments. Better stick with your doctor and your allopurinol which does have an important action in treating gout.

Pantothenic acid has nothing to do with gout. I am sending you the Health Letter number 2-3, Gout, Uric Acid, so you can better understand your problem. Others who want this issue can send 50 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it.

moved surgically unless necessary because it often recurs. They tend to recur regardless of the type of surgery if the patient lives in tropical areas and are less likely to return if a person lives in a more temperate climate. Since you live in the central midwest that is in his favor if it should become necessary to remove it.

Pterygiums are most likely to occur in people exposed to chronic irritation of the conjunctiva from sun and wind. Repeated surgery may cause scarring of the surface of the eye and interfere with vision which is another reason for not hastily doing surgery unless there is a good indication for it.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My husband has irritation in his right eye and the doctor said he had a pterygium. He said this was a small growth which might slowly get larger and there was nothing to do but use some kind of eye-wash for relief. Shouldn't it be removed? I am concerned that it might be malignant or become so. Would this condition eventually damage his eyesight?

DEAR READER — No, a pterygium is not malignant and it will not become malignant. It is really a folded over portion of the thin membrane over the surface of the eye we call the con-
