VOTER REGISTRATION IN DISTRICT UP NINE PERCENT SINCE 1984

Voter registration in the District of Columbia has risen 9.1% since the 1984 Presidential General Election, announced Elections Board Director Emmett H. Fremaux, Jr. today. At the close of voter registration for the November 8th election, 299,757 District residents—nearly 25,000 more than in 1984—were registered to vote. The current registration figure

represents 61.4% of the voting age population in the District.

In addition to the increased voter registration for the 1988 Presidential Election, a steady trend towards higher participation by District voters in Presidential Elections has been recorded every four years since 1972—over the same period that participation rates have been falling off nationwide. When compared to the presidential election turnout in 1980, the District's record turnout of 219,193 in 1984 represented a 24.4% increase in the rate of participation by eligible residents—while the national average rose less than one percent. This increase in participation exceeded that of any state, while 32 of the 50 states showed a decline in the turnout of eligibles. Even though D.C. turnout in Presidential elections is on the rise, however, the level of participation by the District's Voting Age Population in 1984—44.8%—still fell below the national average of 53.1%.
